Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)	Eligible activities: acquisition of real property; relocation and demolition; rehabilitation of residential and non-residential structures ; construction of public facilities and improvements, such as water and sewer facilities, streets, neighborhood centers, and the conversion of school buildings for eligible purposes; public services, within certain limits; activities relating to energy conservation and renewable energy resources; and provision of assistance to profit-motivated businesses to carry out economic development and job creation/retention activities.
CoC (Continuum of Care) Grant (Formerly the individual Supportive Housing Program, Shelter Plus Care, and Single room Occupancy)	5 program components: Permanent housing , transitional housing, supportive services only, Homeless Management Information System, homelessness prevention, other components (safe havens & Section 8 moderate rehabilitation SRO)
Marion County Low Income Housing Trust Fund	A broad range of activities can be funded through this program, including rent subsidies and supports, utility subsidies, security deposits, down payment assistance and the acquisition, rehab, and/or development of structures or vacant lots for the purpose of housing people and families at or below 80% of AMI. Eligible activities include rent subsidies and supports, utility subsidies and supports, down payment assistance, and all costs associated with the acquisition, rehabilitation and/or development of housing structures and/or vacant lots . Costs associated with demolition of existing structures will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
Supported Housing	Like the HUD-VASH program, staff in VA's Supported Housing Program provides ongoing case management services to homeless Veterans. Emphasis is placed on helping Veterans find permanent housing and providing clinical support needed to keep veterans in permanent housing. Staff in these programs operate without benefit of the specially dedicated Section 8 housing vouchers available in the HUD-VASH program but are often successful in locating transitional or permanent housing through local means, especially by collaborating with Veterans Service Organizations.

<p>HUD-VASH</p>	<p>The Department of Housing and Urban Development and Department of Veterans Affairs Supported Housing (HUD-VASH) Program provides permanent housing and ongoing case management treatment services for homeless Veterans who require these supports to live independently. HUD has allocated over 20,000 “Housing Choice” Section 8 vouchers to Public Housing Authorities (PHAs) throughout the country for eligible homeless Veterans. This program allows Veterans and their families to live in Veteran-selected apartment units. The vouchers are portable, allowing Veterans to live in communities where VA case management services can be provided. This program provides for our most vulnerable Veterans, and is especially helpful to Veterans with families, women Veterans, recently returning Veterans and Veterans with disabilities. Evaluation of an earlier, similar program demonstrated that most Veteran participants remained permanently housed.</p>
<p>Low-Income Housing Tax Credits/Se</p>	<p>Tax credits are an indirect Federal subsidy which can be used for the acquisition, rehabilitation, or new construction of rental housing targeted to lower-income households. Eligibility: Be a residential rental property; Commit to one of two possible low-income occupancy threshold requirements; Restrict rents, including utility charges, in low-income units; Operate under the rent and income restrictions for 30 years or longer, pursuant to written agreements with the agency issuing the tax credits (IHCD).</p>
<p>Services in Supportive Housing</p>	<p>The SSH program helps prevent and reduce chronic homelessness by funding services for individuals and families experiencing homelessness living with a severe mental and/or substance use disorder. Grants are awarded competitively for up to five years to community-based public or nonprofit entities. Services supported under the SSH funding include, but are not limited to, outreach and engagement, intensive case management, mental health and substance abuse treatment, and assistance in obtaining benefits.</p>
