

Ending Youth Homelessness Indianapolis Action Plan

In 2010, the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) introduced *Opening Doors*, the first federal strategic plan to prevent and end homelessness. The plan set key goals that included ending homelessness among youth by 2020.

In Indianapolis, the Homeless Youth Taskforce was formed, and the Continuum of Care began planning to help create a path to ending homelessness for youth. The Homeless Youth Taskforce acts as the steering committee for this plan, and will examine options for youth experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness, including RR and PSH interventions, developing a prevention system, and coordinating with school and other youth service organizations to identify youth and connect them to appropriate resources.

What are our goals?

Primary goal:

- Every identified homeless youth ages 18-24 living on the streets or in emergency shelter is provided permanent housing within 30 days of identification, unless they choose to enter transitional housing or a long-term treatment program

Additional goals:

- Serve all homeless youth ages 13-24
- Assure a collaborative and coordinated response system to prevent and end homelessness among youth
- Base our actions on evidence based strategies and our community results
- Evaluate and report our successes and challenges regularly to inform the community and to engage stakeholders to remove barriers or to leverage needed resources

How many youth experiencing homelessness are there in the Indianapolis area?

The chart below highlights the homeless youth documented through our Point in Time process:

The number of youth experiencing homelessness has been increasing slowly from 2012 to the latest 2016 Point in Time count.

What do we mean by ending youth homelessness?

In this plan, ending homelessness is defined as having a system in place that prevents homelessness whenever possible and, when it cannot, implements strategies to assure that homelessness is brief, recoverable and non-recurring. The need for a coordinated homeless response system will continue to exist as youth will face ongoing housing crises. Therefore, we seek to develop a system to include prevention and services, as well as rapid rehousing.

Who will manage this process?

The Homeless Youth Taskforce will act as the steering committee, developing and managing an action plan with key strategies and clear ways to measure success. The group will seek to include all relevant organizations serving homeless youth and preventing homelessness.

How are we defining homeless youth?

For the purpose of this plan, youth will be defined as ages 13 to 24. However, we recognize that federally funded youth housing programs target ages 18 to 24, so we will put special emphasis on housing for this age range. We will focus on those younger than 18 through collaborative approaches with schools and McKinney-Vento Liaisons.

Who is part of the Youth Homeless Taskforce?

The Youth Homelessness Taskforce is a team of nonprofit organizations, schools, government agencies, and others whose goal is to end youth homelessness, as defined by the community, by July 1, 2020 and to demonstrate it by December 1, 2020. The efforts of the taskforce are coordinated through monthly meetings, regular phone and email coordination, and the development and utilization of a Master List to identify and serve all homeless youth in Marion County.
